
Q1 What are the places you most commonly go to for Alaska historical and cultural information? Select up to three.




Q2 What are the barriers for researching Alaska historical and cultural information? Check all that apply.


Q3 Prior to the water leak in December 2017, how frequently did you use the Alaska Collection (materials and resources) at Loussac Library?





If the hours for the Alaska Collection were adjusted so that some evening hours were available, it would provide a better opportunity for students, teachers, parents, and the general public to use the collection. If you adjusted the hours, for instance, by closing on Mondays, and being open in the evening one or two days per week, it would make the collection more accessible to a larger group of users. For example, the Atwood Resource Center at the Anchorage Museum is closed on Mondays to give the staff extra time to do their own work. The National Archives at Seattle offers evening hours to researchers to increase public access to its archival holdings. You might check the Alaska Historical Collections in Juneau website to see if they offer evening hours. I believe that Elmer E. Rasmuson Library, University of Alaska Fairbanks, offers evening hours to increase usage by the citizens of Fairbanks and other non-academic users. Closure on Mondays would also give the Alaska Collection staff at Loussac Library a concentrated core or block of time to do collection development, acquire new titles by reviewing the "Alaskana" column in Alaska History News (Alaska Historical Society), reviewing press announcements from the University of Alaska Press and other publishers, and handling other services. Also, the staff could give workshops on how to use the collection and, especially, prepare an online tutorial that might help teachers, students, and parents (especially the core group that should have a greater awareness of local community history) learn more about Alaska history. I would explore training opportunities with the Anchorage School District by giving an annual workshop to K-12 teachers who teach Alaska History & Studies (a required State of Alaska educational curriculum course that is offered in grades 9-12).



Also, reference librarians can make referrals to other Alaska Collections, as needed, in Fairbanks, Juneau, Seattle, etc.

I've heard rumors that management has a goal to move the Alaska collection to the UAA/APU library. PLEASE don't do that. It's more accessible at Loussac. And I have to say, the Alaska Wing is one of my favorite places. I've always looked forward to coming there to do my research.

I appreciate the digital and downloadable resources the library has, as well as the physical materials. I'd like to see the library not spread itself so thin, trying to do so many diverse things and not doing its core job as well as it should. Focus on materials, library-specific services (ILL, research assistance), and meeting space. Kids programs are good, as is job assistance for adults.

If there is only enough money to support three efforts on the previous list, then the ones I selected would be my choices. But if there was room for more, I would select first the children's programming option, then the space for community events option.

The staff in the Alaska room are so helpful. It is always a pleasure to visit the area. I live in Seward and get to Anchorage 3 or 4 times a year and always use the Alaska room when Lam in town.

The "sacred" copies of the Anchorage Times, that is the actual hard copy editions in bound volumes, are in need of repair or replication. There is probably more information about historical Anchorage in those pages than any other source, but newsprint is deteriorating and microfilm is extremely difficult to use for research. The hard copies of the actual papers are much better when you're not exactly sure what you're looking for.

I would like to see the Genealogy Section improved as well as the AK Section. After all many Alaskans are not born in the state therefore other genealogical books providing information from other states need to be addressed. I would not want to see valuable and rare historical items made available for circulation within the general public. I would like to see more attention paid to the protection and ongoing preservation of the Alaska Collection as well as its complete digitization.

Job searching can be done at the several state Job Centers in the city. Teen and childrens programs are offered by schools, churches, and other public and private places. Programs and classes for adults likewise are offered at a variety of venues. Only a library stores, maintains and makes books, magazines, DVDs, documents, etc. available to the public. This is their only purpose and it is one that no one else does. If resources are limited, those resources should be devoted solely to the main purpose of the library: keeping the heart of civilization/s information safe and making it accessible. Internet capacity likewise is available in many places but should not divert resources from the main purpose of the library, again I emphasize books, newspapers, magazines etc. Well preserved and maintained libraries are essential to students, researchers, and for the enjoyment of our cultural written and recorded history. Only a library performs this duty. Don't dilute it with other activities that are otherwise available.

I love the idea of libraries as spaces for participatory history. Developing programs that speak to such activities make the library a lively rather than static space...

Adequate staffing is the most important thing in a research library, to give assistance.

The AK collection should not be moved to the genealogy section because the two subjects are not related. Keep the AK collection together where there is more security for one-of-a-kind items and with staff knowledgeable in AK history.

The Alaska Collection was built by an expert staff over a long period of time. It would be a shame to water down the collection and not have staff who are familiar enough with it to offer expert reference help.

I think many items should be transferred to the tribes of origin or to Universities.


Library is doing a good job.

Overall, I feel that the Alaska collection is a vastly under utilized asset for our community. I believe that this is what sets our community apart from others and makes it unique. Instead of trying to be like "everywhere else" I believe that the Lousacc should double down its efforts to engage young kids and get them to care about their place in the community and history.

Please evaluate what types of work might be being done adequately (or near adequately) by other institutions in the area with similar missions. Rather than trying to duplicate those responsibilities and expending a great deal of time and money in improving them, look into partnering with those other institutions in those responsibilities. I'm looking around Anchorage and not seeing any institution with a full time Alaskana librarian. Rather than trying to have a position focused solely on that at APL--that ship seems to have sailed as it has for the other institutions that used to have them statewide-is it worth looking into a cooperatively funded position that could serve all of them? Or could this even be done at a statewide level? We have a joint catalog covering a lot of the state, we have SLED, we have all these other statewide resources, maybe it's time to start looking into one or two statewide Alaskana library experts. I was in an Alaskana selection session at AKLA this year and several of the attendees, especially those from small public libraries in AK expressed a need for somebody to go to when building/developing/maintaining a core Alaskan and local collection for their community: and there's really nobody right now in the state that can help out with that. So maybe this is an opportunity. (Clarification: I'm talking about Alaskan books, journals, grey lit, and other media, not archival stuff. There's way more archivists in this state than Alaskana librarians and the two don't do the same thing. The real need is in Alaskana published.) Like with the catalog, a shared position with responsibilities across town or across the state, the costs would be potentially within the reach of far more libraries if one or two people could be funded by and serve all.

Bulldoze the Alaska Wing so that no one (starting, but hardly ending, with me) ever again has to hike all of the way over their in order to access the Alaska Collection. Instead, put the ENTIRE collection on the third floor


Q13 What is your profession?
